- May's Lyme Disease Awareness Month is an excellent reminder that checking
 yourself, children, and pets each day is an important way to reduce the possibility
 of tick-borne illness. The mild winter and wet spring means that the tick
 population will be especially active. The Health District will identify ticks for a \$10
 fee and send ticks to the State of Connecticut laboratory for testing if appropriate.
- Rabies is a deadly virus. Human exposure can result after a family pet has come into contact with a rabid animal. If your pet had physical contact with a wild animal, please keep your animal outside of your house and away from people until it has been assessed. If you must tend to your pet, wear gloves. Call your veterinarian and your town's Animal Control. Bats found in the home are another source for human exposure. Bats that meet certain criteria can be tested for rabies at the state lab. - May is Skin Cancer Awareness Month. The American Academy of Dermatology (AAD) reminds everyone to check their skin for signs of skin cancer. People of all skin tones develop skin cancer.
